A GREEK MYTH






When Jason was a baby, his uncle Pelias stole the throne of Iolcus from his father, Aeson.

Medea, a princess of Corinth, with an arrow of passion for Jason.






Impelled by charmed love, Medea resolves to use her magic to help Jason in three challenges,






Aeëtes' soldiers chase the couple, but Medea and Jason get away by killing the leader, Medea's brother.





Medea tricks the king's daughters into slaying their own father and the couple are forced into hiding once more.






























When Jason and the crowd arrive at the temple, Medea reveals that instead of abandoning her sons, she chose to slay them.
