when Tosca, the great opera singer, arrives. She loves Cavaradossi, but has a jealous nature and is suspicious of the voices she heard. Cavaradossi reassures her, and she departs.




The evil Baron Scarpia, chief of police, plans, a cannon shot warns them that has tracked Angelotti to the church, his escape has been discovered. They and he finds evidence that Cavaradossi leave for Cavaradossi's home, where has helped the prisoner escape.



Tosca returns, and Scarpia - who lusts for Tosca - convinces her that Cavaradossi is involved with another woman. She leaves to confront him, and Scarpia has her followed.



At his palace, Scarpia has Cavaradossi tortured in an effort to discover Angelotti's whereabouts. When Tosca arrives in search of her lover, she is overwhelmed by Cavaradossi's suffering and reveals the hiding place.



Scarpia's henchmen return with the news that the forces of revolution have won a major battle. Cavaradossi shouts his support for the cause of liberty, and Scarpia condemns him to death for treason.



Scarpia makes an ugly proposal:
If Tosca will give herself to him, he
will release Cavaradossi. In desperation,
she agrees, and Scarpia explains that
Cavaradossi will have to pretend to die
in a mock execution.



Before giving in to Scarpia, Tosca insists that he sign travel papers for herself and Cavaradossi to leave the city. After he has done so, she grabs a knife and stabs him.



Cavaradossi laments his fate in prison when Tosca arrives and descibes what has happened and how they will flee.



After the soldiers fire in the mock execution, Tosca goes to Cavaradossi and discovers Scarpia's final betrayal:
The execution was real, her lover is dead.



Vowing to confront Scarpia
before God, Tosca climbs to
the top of the prison walls and
throws herself to her death.
